

# Woodland Park High School

## Profile 2018 – 2019

### The Community

The Woodland Park School District fall of 2017 enrollment was 2,509 students in grades K-12. The town of Woodland Park (approx. pop. 8000) is a small mountain community in Teller County. The school district encompasses 293 square miles. The majority of students live in the rural area of the district or the small surrounding communities. Many residents are employed in the Colorado Springs area, approximately 20 miles east of Woodland Park.

### The School

Woodland Park High School is a four-year public high school which is accredited by the Colorado Department of Education. The high school offers a strong college preparatory curriculum and participates in an area vocational program and several concurrent enrollment classes through Pikes Peak Community College and University of Colorado in Colorado Springs. Vocational classes along with community service programs and internships are also offered on our own campus. The fall 2017 enrollment of 789 students included 190 seniors. The 2017-2018 faculty included 50 certified staff (39 classroom teachers) with a student/teacher ratio of 20/1 and student/ counselor ratio of 263/1. 2017-2018 student attendance rate was 95.54%.

### The Program

- WPHS school year is divided into 2 semesters (Aug. – Dec. and Jan. – May) with 2 quarters in each semester. Students may earn up to 3.5 credits per semester or 7 credits per year.
- WPHS offers an academic program that includes 9 Advanced Placement courses and 5 Honors courses.
- The needs of the exceptional student are supported through Special Education, 504 programming and intervention programs.

### GPA Calculation

Grades are computed on a 4.0 scale. All classes awarding a letter grade are calculated in the weighted and un-weighted GPA.

Repeat courses (previously passed) are not GPA weighted and do not receive credit – the earned grade is recorded on the transcript.

State testing passes receive an additional ¼ credit.

Advisory Passes receive an additional ¼ credit.

### Rank

Rank is calculated at the end of each semester. Both a weighted and un-weighted grade point average and rank are reported on the final transcript.

- Concurrent Enrollment through Pikes Peak Community College to earn high school and college credit: English Comp 121, Literature 115.
- Concurrent Enrollment through UCCS Succeed program to earn high school and college credit: Calculus and Physics.

**AP Authorized Courses****Offered at WPHS in 2018-2019**

Computer Science Principles, U.S. History, English Lit. & Comp., Biology, Chemistry, Environmental Science, Physics 1, Calculus AB, World History, Psychology, Statistics

Student access to AP courses determined by satisfactory completion of coursework, prerequisites, and by student requests.

**Advanced Placement Results**

In May 2018, a total of 152 AP exams were given in 11 subjects. 73 received a score of 3 or better.

**Post-Secondary – Graduating Class of 2018**

64% of the graduating seniors plan to enter college, with 38% attending a four-year institution and 25% attending a two-year college. Vocational/technical schools attracted 3% while 8% reported plans to enter the military. 21% of seniors planned to enter immediately into the work force.

Scholarships were awarded to 38 graduates with a dollar value in excess of \$2,950,000.
