LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Superintendent Dr. Jed Bowman shared the latest on the *proposed* state budget and school funding: \$265 million increase to K-12 funding which includes inflation and enrollment growth; \$150 million to reduce the budget stabilization factor; \$30 million in one-time funds for rural school districts; and \$35 million for school safety. We are still closely watching S.B. 200 PERA Reform which has lot of moving parts and still unknown where this will land. The legislative session is scheduled to adjourn on May 9.

Dr. Bowman updated the Board of Education on *Educator Talent* and reviewed the progress monitoring of what has been happening along with the timeline.
