#### HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETICS & ACTIVITIES REPORT

High School Athletic Director Michael DeWall updated the Board of Education on the athletics and athletics happenings: Athletics: Winter Sports are in their second week of competition. Wrestling - 1-2 in duals with a first place finish at the Buena Vista Demon Duals and a 4th place finish at the Denver North tournament last Saturday with Jordan Houck winning his weight class; Girls Basketball - 2-2 and their next game is December 20 @ Mitchell and will be playing in the Roosevelt Tournament January 5-7; Boys Basketball - 3-2. #### **PUBLIC RELATIONS UPDATE**

Public Relations/Communications/Grant Writing Specialist Stacy Schubloom shared she has been working on the Strategic Planning Stakeholder Survey and has the link to the survey posted on the District website and Facebook page. Print ads will be in the Courier, Mountain Jackpot, and Ute Country News; has an article in the upcoming Chamber Grapevine. Emails have been sent to: parents, staff, Teller County officials, Teller County Sheriff's Dept., City officials and staff, Chamber members, WP Police Dept.; Pikes Peak Regional Hospital staff, Fire Department, VFW, as well as area clergy. The message is on the electronic sign, and many service organizations will be emailed the link to take the survey as well.

#### **SECONDARY UPDATE**

Director of Secondary Schools Tina Cassens shared Middle School just finished MAP testing and seeing some nice growth scores. High School is gearing up for finals which begin next week; already working and discussing registration and possible class offerings for the 2017-2018 school year.

Sue Gill from the Colorado Department of Education was recently in our District and she walked with a team of our staff members and visited both 8th and 9th grade classrooms with the focus being on transitions. At the debrief it became clear to put together a survey for current grade 9 students on what would have been helpful when they transitioned from the middle school to the high school.

Assistant Principal Michael DeWall shared great news that the High School applied and received the Expelled and At-Risk Student Services (EARSS) Restorative Practices Grant from the Colorado Department of Education in the amount of a \$100,934! The EARSS program is authorized by Colorado Revised Statute 22-33-205 to fund competitive grant proposals for which the purposes are to provide education services and support services to expelled students, students at risk of being expelled, or students at risk of being declared, or already are, habitually truant.

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#### **CONSTRUCTION UPDATE**

Superintendent of Schools Dr. Jed Bowman provided the following update to the Board of Education: Holding pond and sidewalk at the intersection of Panther Way and Rampart Range has been completed; asphalt work in the student parking lot has been delayed and will be completed over winter break; Masons continue to work on building the main walls and have installed 4 main steel beams; and IREA will begin installing the primary electrical feeds and main transformer beginning December 19.

#### **LEGISLATIVE UPDATE**

Dr. Bowman shared the added Negative Factor to the Governor's Budget remains and this year the JBC is working in a collaborative effort with the Governor's Office. The early rhetoric is that both Transportation and Medicaid, via the Hospital Provider Fee, will not receive as much money this year as in years past. Most likely a statewide ballot measure will be proposed for a state road tax. The 2017 Legislative Session will convene on January 11, 2017.

#### STRATEGIC PLANNING UPDATE

Dr. Bowman shared he is coordinating with both West Ed and Deliver Ed on when we can anticipate survey results/information and working on scheduling an upcoming workshop with Deliver Ed to work on next steps of developing our Strategic Plan.

#### CHSAA COMMITTEE PARTICIPATION RESOLUTION

Board President Carol Greenstreet read the resolution for Director of Business Services Brian Gustafson to participate on the CHSAA Budget/Property Administration Committee (Addendum C). MOTION Huber, second Dawdy, to approve the resolution as presented. MOTION CARRIED; Voting Aye — Dawdy, Graber, Greenstreet, Huber, Lecky.

#### **WPEA REPORT**

WPEA representative Anna Thompson shared each month they will provide a WPEA Staff Spotlight to highlight specific staff impacts within the Board's End Statement of Academic, Social, and Exploratory Achievement.

This month's spotlight is on Nicole Geniesse from the Middle School: Academic - Nicole is a building leader in the Special Education department. She participates in co-teaching to support student success. Social - Nicole has training in some Restorative Justice techniques and is working with at least one group to repair and enhance social relationships among students. Exploratory - Nicole coaches the high school cheerleading team and they are having an impressive season. Some highlights include: they won the 4A Colorado Springs Metro League Championship; placed 2nd in the Co-Ed division at 'Rumble in the Rockies'; placed 12 out of 39 teams in the Combined 4A/5A State Cheer competition, which is the highest place in school history; and received a bid to Nationals in Dallas, Texas January 20-22, 2017.

#### SUPERINTENDENT REPORT

Dr. Bowman shared connecting students with co-curricular activities and athletics is essential to well roundedness and recognized all of our activity sponsors and coaches in our District. Their countless hours of commitment to provide the wide range of opportunities for our students are appreciated!

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Reviewed upcoming key dates for the Board to mark on their calendars: December 22 – January 6 – Holiday Break; Wednesday, January 11 – Board of Education Meeting.

Dr. Bowman gave ongoing kudos to Stacy Schubloom for her continued work to promote positive news, for planning the Choice campaign, by providing assistance for grant writing, and for assisting with the Strategic Planning Process to name only a few.

Dr. Bowman shared we have begun initial planning for the 2017-18 budget. The Governor's proposal includes an additional \$50 million of Negative Factor.

Dr. Bowman expressed his gratitude to the Board of Education for their ongoing support of our educational community. We are fortunate to have a Board committed to supporting us as we embrace learning and growing.

#### **BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT**

Directors Nancy Lecky and Gwynne Dawdy shared out information from the sessions they attended at the annual CASB Convention. The one of particular interest was on Strategic Planning presented by Eagle County School District.
